

About The Symposium

The 2017 Breastfeeding Symposium will provide current information and evidence-based practice recommendations related to optimal breastfeeding care and support. This symposium will present topics including institutional culture and the impact on breastfeeding; evidence based management and use of the breastfeeding resource nurse program; breastfeeding in vulnerable infants; techniques to identify and provide lactation support; strategies for supporting families dealing with postpartum depression; support for breastfeeding mothers with babies in the acute and intensive care settings; recognition of new mothers' concerns related to breastfeeding in the postpartum period; evidence based factors that impact breastfeeding and identifying ways to support, promote and protect breastfeeding.
